After completing her studies in Educational Science, Sociology and Psychology at the University of Cologne she enrolled for an MSc Gender at the Gender Institute of the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) where she also worked on her PhD thesis (2001-2003) and in the academic year 2010-11 was a guest lecturer.

2004 she completed her PhD in Gender Studies at Humboldt-University in Berlin where in 2005 she became postdoc in the research training group "Gender as a Category of Knowledge" (funded by the DFG) and a researcher in 2007. 2008 Sabine Grenz started as a post-doc at the University of Gothenburg. Since 2014 she is a board member of the German Gender Studies Association.

2012 she began a new research project about gendered discourses of meanings of life at the Comenius-Institute in Muenster and 2013-15 she taught as an assistant professor/researcher at the Georg-August-University of Goettingen. In 2015 she was visiting professor at the University of Ghent and in 2016 and 2017 at the University of Gothenburg. 2015 she was appointed acting professor at the Goettingen Institute for Diversity Research. In 2017 she became professor for Gender Studies at the University of Vienna
