Abstract:

This presentation aims to enrich the discussion on the current challenges of a two-year observation, from the first task of finding a "suitable" baby to observe, to the point of stopping the weekly visits and saying goodbye to the two-year old and the family. This includes the significance of the task and role of the seminar leader and the value of observation as a route to learning from experience about unconscious life for the individual student and the seminar group. The presentation also addresses the question of how babies and parents might experience infant observation.
