Abstract:

In my contribution, I would like to address critical points that may arise in the implementation of the classical method of Infant Observation (IO). They not only touch on ethical issues concerning the child being observed, the parents and the training candidates, but also question some of the theoretical maxims of IO. As a parent-infant/toddler psychotherapist and lecturer at a psychoanalytic institute, I would like to report on alternative experiences with video analysis.
